—THE CHALLENGE COIN—

A challenge coin is a small coin or medallion, bearing an organization's insignia or emblem and carried by the organization's members. The challenge coin has been an American tradition for a century, meant to instill unit pride, improve esprit de corps, reward hard work and excellence, and as a recognition of special achievement. The coins represent anything from a small unit to the offices of top leaders. There are also coins made for special events, anniversaries, and military and nonmilitary leaders. Many individuals proudly display challenge coins at their desks or homes, showing off their many accomplishments. Some say the exchanging of challenge coins dates to World War I, where mementos were given to high achievers, hard workers, and individuals of excellent character. At the University of Charleston, we pride ourselves on productive work, enlightened living and community involvement. Tonight, we would like to recognize those students who exemplify these characteristics in the School of Leadership's undergraduate curriculum by completing their degrees.

—THE HOODING CEREMONY—

The hooding ceremony confers a special recognition upon graduates receiving master's or doctoral degrees. The hooding originated in European universities in the 11th or 12th century and was introduced to distinguished graduating students as they began their academic careers. As hooded robes were often worn for warmth and practical uniform for scholars, over time the robes became largely symbolic. Universities added colors to the robes to differentiate students by their academic majors, and the hoods later became detached ornaments, presented to graduates as part of the commencement ceremony. Hoods are still used today to represent a commitment to a scholarly life. While modern day undergraduates wear robes and caps, those with master's or doctorate degrees are presented with hoods to show their continued pursuit of knowledge. Such hoods are an expression of tradition and are used to communicate the wearer's school, degree, and field of study for the rest of their lives.
